## Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own in various forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

**Copying:** using the same or very similar words to the original text or images without quotation marks or source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without acknowledgment.

**Inappropriate paraphrasing:** Changing a few words and phrases while retaining the overall structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information is not acknowledged. This applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without acknowledgment.

**Collusion:** working with others but passing off the work as a person's own. This includes providing your work to another student before the due date, copying another person's work, plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, or offering to complete another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's academic work in return for payment for completing academic work.

**Inappropriate citation:** Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledgment of the source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

**Duplication ("self-plagiarism"):** submitting your own work, in whole or in part, which has already been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including electronic resources and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre. One of the most commonly identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should be encouraged to plan their research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assignments.

UNSW Library also has the ELISE tool available to assist you with your research. ELISE is designed to introduce new students to studying at UNSW but it can also be used by returning students.

Completing the ELISE tutorial and quiz will enable you to:

- analyse topics, plan responses and organise research for academic tasks
- effectively and efficiently find appropriate information sources and evaluate them against your needs
- use and manage information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose
