Summary of the Course

Subject Area: Sociology and Anthropology

How do individuals experience the process of growing older? Consider this course examines how the biological language of ageing relates to the youth, adulthood, and old age. Through an investigation of sociological and anthropological perspectives on the life-course, you will examine the social and political processes which are challenged, and with which biographical lives are shaped. Sub-topics include: youth; birth and death; embodiment and technology; old age and ageing; intergenerationality; gender and sexuality.

Course Learning Outcomes

1. Solid grasp of key sociological and anthropological theories of the life-course
2. Insight into scholarly debates surrounding the sociological and anthropological perspectives on youth and old age.
3. Enhanced capacity for independent research, analysis, and writing
4. Enhanced oral communication, facilitation, and presentation skills
5. Ability to work collaboratively and respectfully with other students in seminars, discussions and small group exercises
6. Capacity to reflect on one's own learning and to chart steps for future learning

Teaching Strategies

Seminar topics are used to address major themes and ideas about the study of the life-course, building up the theoretical context for exploring key issues. The teaching style in the 3-hour seminar is interactive. This involves developing students' understanding of the subject matter with the goal of sharing their views.
